

# Hallow Parish Profile 2014

## Overview

Annual Precept £24,580

Hallow is a rural parish covering 643 hectares. It encompasses a primary school within the boundaries of the parish. The nearest secondary school is 4km from the centre of the parish.

The nearest hospital is 6km from the centre of the parish (31min on public transport). The nearest GP practice is 4km from the centre of the parish (13min on public transport).



## Interpretation of the Data – Hallow

This supplementary document explores some of the underlying data from the profile and links it to the data at a district-level.

**Precept** In 2014/15 the average parish precept in Malvern Hills District was £43.66 per household and the range from £100.42 to £1.53. The precept for Hallow was £46.20 the 10th largest out of 53.

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**Population** Hallow is the 12th largest parish in Malvern Hills. Between 2001 and 2011 the population growth was 4%, slightly more than the total district growth of 3.4

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**Households (dwellings with residents)** The number of households has increased from 502 to 532. Despite the small rise in population, the size of households decreased from 2.34 persons to 2.29. The number of single person households has increased by 17% from 133 to 156 (29% of all households). 60% of single person households are single pensioner households have increased by 8% from 87 to 94 (18% of all households).

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**Older people** The number of persons aged 60 and over has increased by 18% from 337 to 399. Persons aged 75 and over have increased by 33% from 110 to 146. The population has aged significantly and that trend is likely to continue.

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**Children** The number of persons aged 0 to 15 has increased by 3% from 205 to 212. This upward trend is common to only one third of parishes.

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**Deprivation** The Index of Multiple Deprivation shows that 16 households (3.0%) are deprived in three out of the four dimensions of employment, education, housing and health and disability, the district-level percentage is 3.2%. However, Housing or Council Tax benefit claimants are higher and JSA claimants lower than the district average.

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**Cars and vans** The number of households with no access to a car/van has decreased from 69 to 66. This means that 12% of households have no access.

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**Health** The percentage of the population reporting good or very good health in each parish ranges from 91% to 75%. In Hallow it is 82% but the number of people reporting that they are healthy will likely reduce as the population ages.

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**Considerations** How to ensure that care and support for older people is sustained and developed as the population continues to age. Working in partnerships with other parishes and the statutory authorities is likely to be helpful.

How to minimise social isolation as the number of single person households increases.

How to sustain and develop transport services particularly for the 12% with no access to a car or van.

How to ensure that deprived households have access to supporting services and benefits. Promotion of the CAB Community Liaison Volunteers may be helpful.
