Annual Precept £5,000

Mamble is a rural parish covering 924 hectares. The nearest primary school is 2km from the centre of the parish. The nearest secondary school is 5km from the centre of the parish.



Interpretation of the Data – Mamble

This supplementary document explores some of the underlying data from the profile and links it to the data at a district-level.

Precept In 2014/15 the average parish precept in Malvern Hills District was £43.66 per household and the range from £100.42 to £1.53. The precept for Mamble was £41.32 the 15th largest out of 53.

Population Mamble is the 44th largest parish in Malvern Hills. Between 2001 and 2011 the population declined by 7%, whereas at a district-level the population grew by 3.4%.

Households (dwellings with residents) The number of households has increased from 119 to 121. The declining population has contributed to the size of households decreasing from 2.59 persons to 2.36. The number of single person households has increased by 47% from 19 to 28 (23% of all households). 46% of single person households are single pensioner households; this has remained at 13.

Older people The number of persons aged 60 and over has increased by 34% from 67 to 90. Persons aged 75 and over have increased by 58% from 19 to 30. The population has aged significantly and that trend is likely to continue.

Children The number of persons aged 0 to 15 has decreased by 33% (4th largest decrease in the District) from 63 to 42. This downward trend is common to two thirds of parishes.

Deprivation Housing or Council Tax benefit and JSA claimants are lower than the District average.

Cars and vans The number of households with no access to a car/van has decreased from 11 to 6 but this still means that 5% of households rely on other means of transportation.

Health The percentage of the population reporting good or very good health in each parish ranges from 91% to 75%. In Mamble it is 80% but the number of people reporting that they are healthy will likely reduce as the population ages.

Considerations How to ensure that care and support for older people is sustained and developed as the population continues to age. Working in partnerships with other parishes and the statutory authorities is likely to be helpful particularly for smaller parishes such as Mamble.

How to minimise social isolation as the number of single person households increases.

How to sustain and develop transport services particularly for the 5% with no access to a car or van.

How to ensure that deprived households have access to supporting services and benefits. Promotion of the CAB Community Liaison Volunteers may be helpful.
