Overview

Annual Precept £7,000

Bayton is a rural parish covering 913 hectares. It encompasses a primary school within the boundaries of the parish. The nearest secondary school is 4km from the centre of the parish.

Communications and transport (nearest distances are straight lines 'as crow flies')

The most accessible hospital is 13km from the centre of the parish (36min on public transport). The most accessible GP practice is 9km from the centre of the parish (30min on public transport).



Interpretation of the Data – Bayton

This supplementary document explores some of the underlying data from the profile and links it to the data at a district-level.

Precept In 2014/15 the average parish precept in Malvern Hills District was £43.66 per household and the range from £100.42 to £1.53. The precept for Bayton was £33.65 the 22nd largest out of 53.

Population Bayton is the 32nd largest parish in Malvern Hills. Between 2001 and 2011 the population growth was 14% (7th highest in the District), greater than the district-level growth of 3.4%.

Households (dwellings with residents) The number of households has increased from 183 to 208. Despite the significant increase in population, the size of households remains unchanged at 2.41 persons. The number of single person households has decreased by 12% from 43 to 38 (18% of all households). 68% of single person households are single pensioner households; this has increased by 4% from 25 to 26.

Older people The number of persons aged 60 and over has increased by 73% (2nd highest in the District) from 107 to 185. Persons aged 75 and over have increased by 19% from 37 to 44. The population has aged significantly and that trend is likely to continue.

Children The number of persons aged 0 to 15 has remained at 76. A static or downward trend is common to two thirds of the parishes.

Deprivation The Index of Multiple Deprivation shows that 5 households (2.4%) are deprived in three or four of the dimensions of employment, education, housing and health and disability, the district-level percentage is 3.2%. Housing or Council Tax benefit and JSA claimants are also lower than the district average.

Cars and vans The number of households with no access to a car/van has decreased slightly from 11 to 7. This still means that 3% of households rely on other means of transportation (13th lowest in the District).

Health The percentage of the population reporting good or very good health in each parish ranges from 91% to 75%. In Bayton it is 80% but the number of people reporting that they are healthy will likely reduce as the population ages.

Considerations How to ensure that care and support for older people is sustained and developed as the population continues to age. Working in partnerships with other parishes and the statutory authorities is likely to be helpful.

How to minimise social isolation as the number of single person households is likely to increase.

How to sustain and develop transport services particularly for the 3% with no access to a car or van.

How to ensure that deprived households have access to supporting services and benefits. Promotion of the CAB Community Liaison Volunteers may be helpful.
