Overview

Annual Precept £5,000

The Shelsleys is a rural parish covering 1123 hectares. The nearest primary school is 3km away from the centre of the parish. The nearest secondary school is 4km away from the centre of the parish.

Communications and transport (nearest distances are straight lines 'as crow flies')

The most accessible hospital is 17km away from the centre of the parish (1hr 6min on public transport). The nearest GP practice is 3km away from the parish centre (12min on public transport).



Interpretation of the Data – The Shelsleys

This supplementary document explores some of the underlying data from the profile and links it to the data at a district level.

Precept	In 2014/15 the average parish precept in Malvern Hills District was £43.66 per household and the range from £100.42 to £1.53. The precept for The Shelsleys was £33.78 the 21st largest out of 53.
Population	The Shelsleys is the 37th largest parish in Malvern Hills. Between 2001 and 2011 the population grew by 5%, slightly more than the total district growth of 3.4%.
Households (dwellings with residents)	The number of households has increased from 142 to 148. The small increase in population has contributed to the size of households remaining largely unchanged at 2.57 persons. The number of single person households has increased by 27% from 22 to 28 (19% of all households). 50% of single person households are single pensioner households; this has decreased by 13% from 16 to 14 in 2011.
Older people	The number of persons aged 60 and over has increased by 19% from 90 to 107. Persons aged 75 and over have decreased by 18% from 28 to 23. Despite that latter figure the population is likely to age.
Children	The number of persons aged 0 to 15 has increased by 10% from 61 to 67. This upward trend is common to only one third of parishes.
Deprivation	Housing or Council Tax benefit and JSA claimants are also lower than the district average.
Cars and vans	The number of households with no access to a car/van has decreased slightly from 11 to 8 but this still means that 5% of households rely on other means of transportation.
Health	The percentage of the population reporting good or very good health in each parish ranges from 91% to 75%. In The Shelsleys it is 88% but the number of people reporting that they are healthy will likely reduce as the population ages.

Considerations How to ensure that care and support for older people is sustained and developed as the population continues to age. Working in partnerships with other parishes and the statutory authorities is likely to be helpful.

How to minimise social isolation as the number of single person households increases.

How to sustain and develop public transport services particularly for the 5% with no access to a car or van.

How to ensure that deprived households have access to supporting services and benefits. Promotion of the CAB Community Liaison Volunteers may be helpful.
